As we proudly present this Fifth Edition of the *Prince George's County Quality of Life Index*®, coinciding with the 20th Anniversary of the *Greater Prince George's Business Roundtable*, we continue to honor our pledge to you that the Index will always be a living document. It will always be a document that will be updated and revised as needed to meet the challenges of presenting data that gives a fair and accurate representation of the County, both in relationship to its own past, and how it appears in relation to our neighbors elsewhere in the state.

We continue to present the indicators that matter the most to you, providing data on the ***Economy, Education, Public Safety, Health, Transportation and Parks and Recreation***, using these categories as our starting point for the examination, with sub-categories that will change as their relevance increases or decreases over time.

Our goal remains to show where the county stands today, but also to measure it against the past to determine whether or not progress is being made in the delivery of services.

The county's story since the last Index was published in 2018 cannot be told without a chapter on the Covid-19 pandemic. The data is startling, as businesses, schools and our churches were forced to close their doors and operate virtually, or not at all. The county faced more confirmed cases of Covid than any other jurisdiction in the state. No family escaped Covid and its impacts. In spite of this, Prince George's County has been able to rebound and to grow, showing a resilience and strength inherent to this community, shattering all-time highs in median home sale prices and sales taxes collected and achieving record lows in unemployment. Credit County Executive Angela Alsobrooks, the County Council, the County Department of Health, our first-class county hospitals and our amazing team of first responders for working together to get so many through this unprecedented crisis.

The county has held firm on crime, with numbers that, in many ways, bucked the trends of the region and the nation. Echoing what we've seen elsewhere, there have been significant increases in auto thefts, after nearly two decades of marked improvement, as social media sites help to encourage and enable auto thefts for sport.

This document continues to break down rhetoric and assumption and replaces them with facts and information, so that county residents and our elected officials can determine where the county is doing well, and also observe the areas where it can improve, with a non-partisan approach dedicated only to making Prince George's County the best place to live, work and play in the region.

Prince George's County is moving forward, together, and our story is worth telling. We at the Business Roundtable are honored to be able to present this information to you.

ECONOMIC INDICATORS

The median sales price of homes in Prince George’s County is 142 percent higher than just ten years ago. Median sales prices have leapt from \$165,000 in early 2013 to \$400,000 at the same period in 2023.

As a result of the pandemic, Prince George’s saw its unemployment rate increase 2.35 times from the end of 2019 through the end of 2020, finishing the latter year at 8.0 percent.

While the rate has since decreased to 2.7 percent at the end of 2022, the total number of people working in the county has shrunk by more than 38,500 since year-end 2019.

From Fiscal year 2021 to FY 2022, Food & Beverage Sales Taxes in Prince George’s increased by over \$130 million, as the economy returned in full force following two years of slowdown and shutdown brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic.

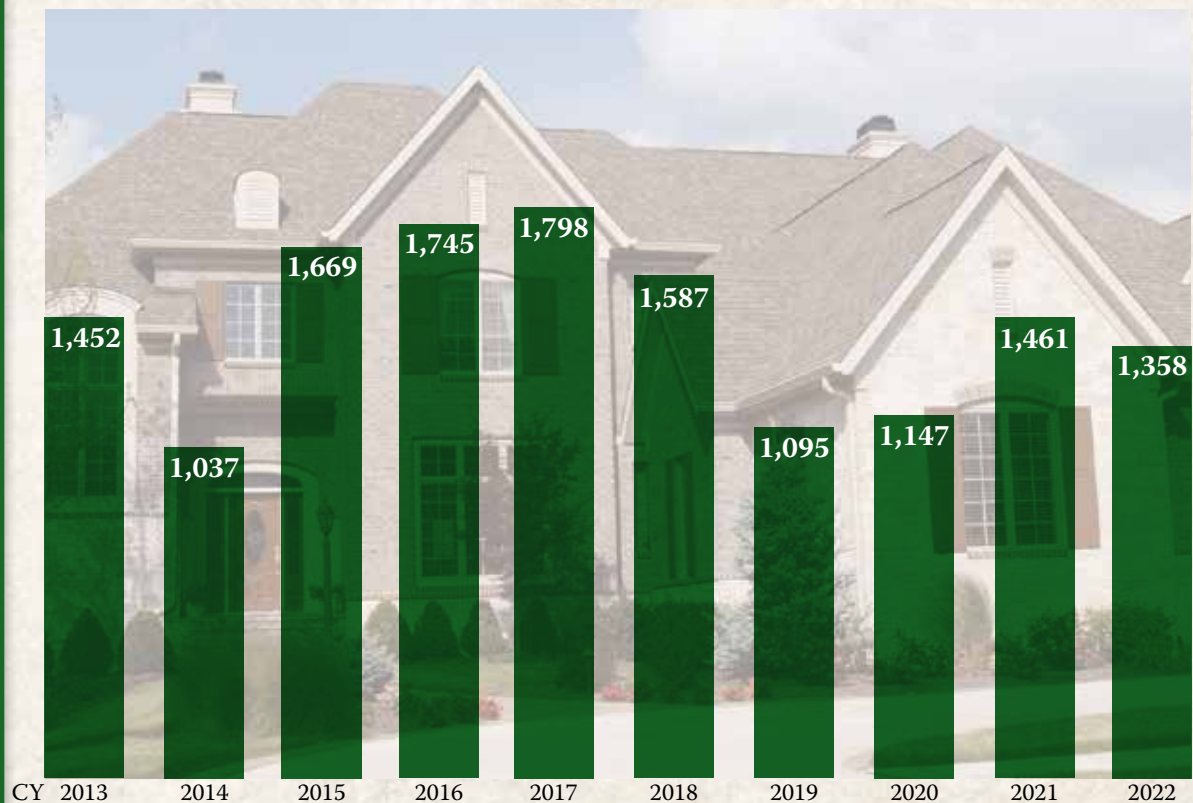

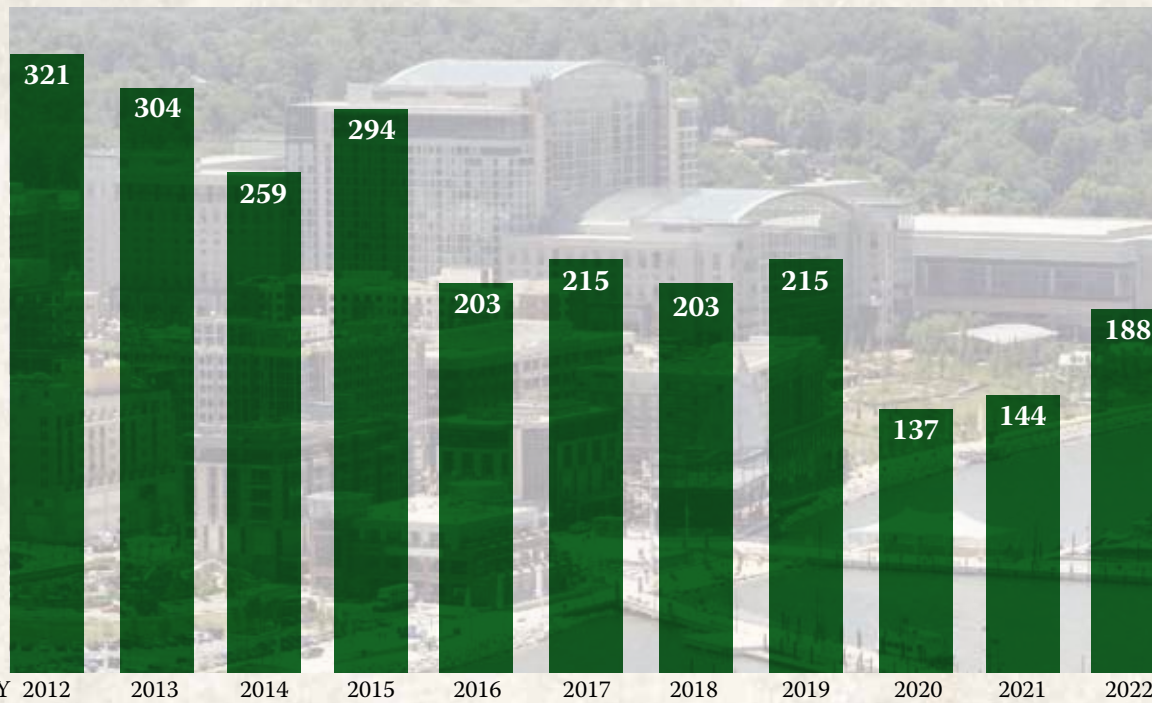

There can never be too great an emphasis put on the education of our young people, for they are the future of Prince George’s County, this nation and the world.

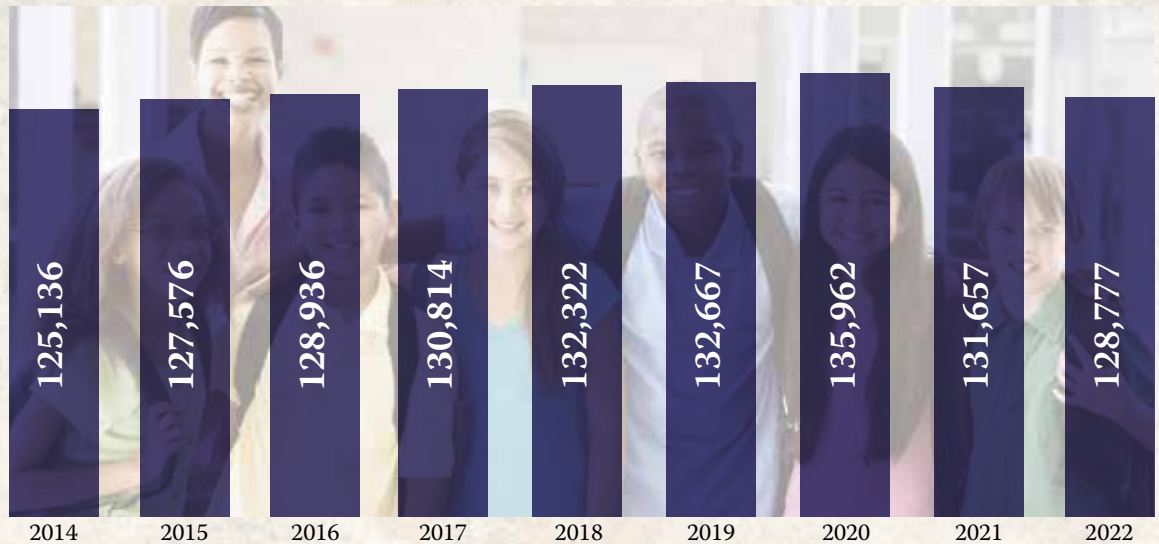
The Covid pandemic took its toll on the county school system, negatively impacting enrollment, the number of qualified teachers, the amount our students earned in scholarship dollars and the population beginning their college journey.

It is a credit to the entire system that last school year saw students earn the second-highest return ever in scholarship funding. In fewer than ten years, the amount of scholarship money earned by our young people more than doubled.

Covid hurt a great deal in our population of Nationally Board Certified Teachers, as the system saw a drop of nearly 39 percent in this population, coming out of virtual and returning to in-person learning.

Prince Georgians commute, nearly as long as anybody (We have the third-longest commute in the state), to positions outside the county, with the continued discrepancy in GSA-leased space in play.

We will continue to work with our federal and local elected officials, along with our business partners, to bring agencies and companies to Prince George's County, ushering in a new age of shorter commutes and growth around the county's mass transit hubs. Such efforts have already resulted in expansions of the missions at Joint Base Andrews, along with the movement of The Bureau of Printing and Engraving and The Department of Homeland Security's Citizenship and Immigration services into to the county.
